Class: Holocaust

Lesson Plan: Comparing current Antisemitism Policies and Initiatives of the United States (US) and the European Union (EU)

Florida Standard:

SS.912.HE.3.5 - Recognize that antisemitism includes a certain perception of the Jewish people, which may be expressed as hatred toward Jewish people, rhetorical and physical manifestations of antisemitism directed toward a person or his or her property or toward Jewish community institutions or religious facilities.

Duration 2-3 class periods (45—60 minutes)

Essential Question:

• In what way are the US and EU, through their policies, addressing and policing antisemitism, racism, and hate crimes?

Learning Objectives:

- Students will analyze and compare antisemitism policies in the US and EU to gain a deeper understanding of the approaches taken to combat antisemitism.
- Students will examine historical contexts, legal framework, and initiatives undertaken by both the US and EU,
- Analyze and evaluate the effectiveness of these policies in combating antisemitism.
- Goal is to develop a greater understanding of the issues surrounding antisemitism, increase critical thinking through research, and increase their appreciation for multiculturism.

Materials:

- Access to Internet and/or the media center for research (devise to access the internet)
- Handouts with definitions of antisemitism and policies in the US and EU
- Chart paper and markers
- Whiteboard and markers
- Projector or printed worksheets (optional)
- Note-taking material

Procedure:

Day 1: Introduction and Historical Context

- Start by introducing the <u>historical context of antisemitism</u>. Then transition to comparing US and EU policies on Antisemitism. Start by asking them if they have any **prior knowledge and perceptions** of antisemitism policies in the US and the EU.
- 2. Divide students into groups (4-5) and assign each group with a research topic. Each group will be provided with a different policy from the US and EU to analyze such as:
 - a. EU's Framework Decision on Racism and Xenophobia
 - b. EU's Combating hate speech and hate crime
 - c. US Antisemitism Awareness Act
- 3. Each Group will research (in class) and create a presentation or chart that compares and contrasts the assigned policy to another groups policy.

Day 2: Presentation and Comparative Analysis

- Each group will present their research findings and key points using visual aids or any other multimedia technology regarding antisemitism policies. Presentation should highlight specific initiatives, organizations, or legal measures taken to address antisemitism.
 - a. Have students take notes for use later in class discussion
- Each group presents their research and key points that highlight specific initiatives, organizations, and/or legal measures taken to address antisemitism. Class discussion uses Philosophical Chairs – AVID. (Note -Students should be taking notes on key points during the discussion).
 - a. Key questions to consider to prompt discussion:
 - i. How effective do you think the policies are?
 - ii. What are the strengths and weaknesses of each?
 - iii. What are the lessons learned.
- 3. Summarize the main points of the discussion and have the students in small groups reflect on what they learned.
- 4. Conclude the lesson and encourage further exploration into antisemitism.

Assessment

- Group presentations or chart along with class participation
 - Quality of the presentation or chart
- Reflection paper/essay highlighting key takeaways from the lesson and how they can contribute to combatting antisemitism in their community.
- Informal assessment during class discussion
