#### Looking for the lost institutional balance: life after Lisbon

- Before Lisbon
- o Since Lisbon
- o Is there still a college of Commissioners?
- Community method at risk
- o Politics or bureaucracy?
- Drift from strategy to technicity
- Decision-making has become case-by-case in secondary legislation
- Strong impact on EU lobbying

### **Lobbying after Lisbon**

- Classical lobbying shaped by Community method
  - ✓ Transparency prevailed
  - ✓ Uniform rules applied to comitology procedures
  - ✓ Critical roles of desk officers, interservice consultation and heads of cabinet
  - ✓ Large room to manoeuver in first reading
- Post-Lisbon
  - ✓ Commission's legislative proposal monopoly challenged
  - ✓ Trilogues
  - ✓ Less engagement from college of Commissioners
  - ✓ Rubberstamping + ratification vote instead of deliberations
  - ✓ Quality of primary legislation suffers
- Lobbying lessons to draw
  - ✓ Get started early on with all 3 institutions
  - ✓ Map out relevant + influential players in Commission, EP and Council
  - ✓ Key battles increasingly into secondary legislation
  - ✓ Lobbying has become more legalistic and ad hoc



#### Lobbying in the drafting phase

- Anticipate
- o Is there still a unique decision-maker?
- Paying attention to legal basis
- o When/how to exert influence?
- o Towards whom?
- Earn trust of desk officer
- Speak with one voice
- Rely less on interservice consultation and heads of cabinets

## Lobbying in the adoption phase

- 80% of acts adopted in first reading
- Concentrate on essentials → framework legislation
- Learn about trilogues' dynamics and contents in the EP
- Follow COREPER and relevant expert groups
- o Integrate secondary legislation in reflections for action

#### Lobbying in the implementation phase

- Identify procedures
  - ✓ RPS
  - ✓ Delegated acts
  - ✓ Implementing acts
- o Read draft from a content + procedural perspective:
  - ✓ Reduce possibility for the Commission to adopt a text after the examination committee expresses "no opinion"

#### Lobbying on delegated acts and implementing acts

- Identify the applicable procedure
- Delegated acts
  - ✓ Concentrate action on the desk officer and relevant Commission unit drafting the delegated act
  - ✓ Develop key contacts/alliance with Member States eager to veto
- o Implementing acts:
  - ✓ Concentrate on the committee of national experts for implementing acts (in addition to desk officers)
  - ✓ Seek support in Permanent Representations
